During the reporting period, the affirmative action staff at Central Connecticut State University (CCSU) was led initially by Carolyn Magnan, University Counsel, upon the departure of Interim Vice President Nancy Barcelo. In February of 2021, Dr. Stacey A. Miller was hired as the Vice-President for Equity and Inclusion. Her staff consists of Erin Rodas, CSU Administrative Assistant and Michelle Shaw, Equity and Inclusion Associate. All communications concerning Equal Employment Opportunity/Affirmative Action identifies the Vice President for the Office for Equity and Inclusion by name and address.

CCSU disseminates its Equal Employment Opportunity/Affirmative Action Policy as required. The University's Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Policy, CCSU's policy on Sexual Harassment, and the Nondiscrimination in Education and Employment are distributed annually to all employees via email transmission which is globally distributed in hard copy to employees without email access. The Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Policy Statement, Nondiscrimination in Education and Employment Policy, the BOR/CSCU Sexual Misconduct Reporting, Supportive Measures, and Processes Policy, and the CCSU complaint procedures and timetables are also posted on the OEI's web page at http://www.ccsu.edu/diversity/ and are accessible to applicants, employees, and students.

A summary of the objectives and goals set forth in the Affirmative Action Plan are made available to the president, all vice presidents, chief officers, deans, directors, department heads, managers, and supervisors for distribution to all employees. Copies of the Affirmative Action Plan are maintained and stored in the Office for Equity and Inclusion, Office of the President, and additional locations around campus, including but not limited to the University's Elihu Burritt Library and Human Resources. The final approved Affirmative Action Plan is made available to all employees for their review on the University's website, and the above-mentioned locations. The period of review is no less than sixty (60) days (See copy of letter specifying the period of review in Supportive Materials).

All employees are given written notice that they may review and comment on the Affirmative Action Plan. The employees are instructed to address all comments to the Vice President for the Office for Equity & Inclusion. A file is kept on all affirmative action related internal communications and comments received throughout the reporting period. Any new comments will be placed in this file and the dates such statements are received will be noted. The Affirmative Action Plan will report a summary of all employee comments and agency responses in each filing. No comments were received during this reporting period.

Activity during this Reporting Period

The Affirmative Action Plan was made available for all employees to review and comment. Employees were notified on March 1, 2021 where copies of the Plan were located, the period of review and the dates within which they may submit comments regarding the Plan.

All Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Policy Statements are reviewed annually to ensure that any changes in the law, which may have occurred, are included therein. An abridged version of the policy statements on Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity, as well as policy statements on Sexual Misconduct (including sexual harassment), and Non-discrimination for Persons with Disabilities are published in the Student Handbook, Faculty Handbook, and Faculty Guidelines on Policy and Procedures for Students with Disabilities. The Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Policy Statement is published in the electronic catalogue. In addition, the Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Policy Statement, Policy Regarding Persons with Disabilities, BOR/CSCU Sexual Misconduct Reporting, Supportive Measures, and Processes Policy, and the CCSU

Procedures and Timetables for Processing of Discrimination, and Harassment, Intimate Partner Violence and Sexual Misconduct Complaints as well as the University's 2020-2021 hiring, promotion, and program goals can be accessed through the website at http://www.ccsu.edu/Diversity/.

The President's Executive Committee was informed on affirmative action recruiting, hiring, and promotional efforts, as well as updates on affirmative action and non-discrimination law. The Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity Policy Statement and the Sexual Misconduct Policy, as well as program information and progress reports are presented to the committee yearly (see attached agendas in the Supportive Materials section).

The University Counsel, acting in the capacity of acting Director of the Office for Equity & Inclusion, met with the deans on a regular basis to discuss the policies, procedures and progress pertaining to affirmative action, in addition to their responsibility to aid in effectively implementing these policies. The newly appointed Vice President for the Office for Equity & Inclusion (OEI) will continue to meet with the Executive Committee regarding the affirmative action plan and related diversity and inclusion programs.

The University Counsel provided the human resources staff, search committees and the Promotion and Tenure Committee with a periodic update of the status of hiring and promotion goal achievement, in addition to reminding these individuals of their responsibility to make every good faith effort to achieve the hiring and promotion goals when the opportunity occurs. The new Vice President for OEI has begun to meet with human resources and staff to encourage them to continue to achieve affirmative action hiring goals and to diversify the faculty and staff.

Meeting with Search Committees

The Senior Equity & Inclusion Officer met with all search committees seeking to fill unclassified vacancies to discuss the search procedures, affirmative action goals, recruitment strategies, evaluation of candidates, and non-discriminatory interviewing. She also updated the affirmative action plan forms, instructions for search committees, and the pre-employment inquiry guidelines distributed to the search committees. The OEI staff answered numerous inquiries from the search committees throughout the year related to the search procedures.

New Employee Orientations

The Human Resources Office directs all new employees to the Central Connecticut State University sign up portal on the HR website. This website is dedicated to providing new employees information regarding the University including: the University Mission Statement, Statement on Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity, Sexual Harassment Policy, Health and Life Insurance, as well as personnel policies relating to compensation, attendance, and career mobility. This website is regularly updated to reflect changes in policies and procedures.

During the reporting period, OEI provided all new employees copies of the Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Policy Statement, Central Connecticut State University (CCSU) Sexual Misconduct Policy, the CCSU Intimate Partner Violence and Sexual Misconduct Complaints Harassment Complaints, and the information on students with disabilities services. OEI has been handling these responsibilities and continues to provide copies of the AA/EEO policies to new employees. Newly hired faculty members were also presented with these policies during New Faculty Orientation. In addition, Staff of the Office for Equity & Inclusion met with the new faculty and staff at the beginning of the Fall semester to provide them with President Toro's objectives in the areas of Equity and Inclusion and University policies and her contact number.

The Office of Marketing & Communications includes articles and pictures related to the activities and accomplishments in University publications as well as in the media of underrepresented group members who are part of the University community. This office publishes articles in the CCSU Courier, Central Focus, and The Recorder featuring Affirmative Action/Equal Employment Opportunity, diversity programs, and reports on the promotions of minority group members.

These programs included but were not limited to:

Red Flag Campaign

The Office of Victim Advocacy leads the Red Flag Campaign, a national campaign dedicated to raising awareness about healthy and unhealthy relationships. In Fall 2020, five students were selected to work, volunteer, and/or intern in the Office of Victim Advocacy to assist with this campaign. Students participated in a training session about dating violence, healthy relationships, and violence prevention,

and then worked together to plan the semester-long campaign with the guidance of the victim advocate.

The Red Flag Campaign consisted of four main components: Red flag placement; virtual classroom presentations; a poster campaign; and social media.

- Red flag placement: The Red Flag Campaign includes a visual element of placing physical red flags in locations on campus to bring awareness to the campaign. Over 100 individual flags were placed in high traffic areas on the CCSU campus, including along walkways around the Student Center and around Vance Lawn. In addition, lawn signs were placed near the flags with the message "Blue Devils say something when they see a relationship red flag" and the Office of Victim Advocacy social media accounts. The goal of the lawn signs was to provide more information about the campaign and the meaning of the flags for people who saw them.
- Virtual Classroom presentations: Student staff worked with the victim advocate to develop a 15-minute classroom presentation about the Red Flag Campaign and healthy relationships. In an email sent to the entire campus community, faculty members were encouraged to invite the victim advocate and a student staff member to their virtual class to give a presentation about the campaign. During the Fall 2020 semester, the Office of Victim Advocacy conducted 9 virtual classroom presentations. Number of student contacts: 235
- *Poster campaign:* The Red Flag Campaign provides posters for campuses utilizing the campaign. These posters depict information about unhealthy relationship "red flags." Posters were distributed around the CCSU campus.
- Social media: The Office of Victim Advocacy used Instagram, Snapchat, and Facebook to share
 information about the Red Flag Campaign, including photos of the flags, posters, and videos, as
 well as graphics with information about healthy relationships.

Stand Up CCSU Campaign

Every Spring semester, the Office of Victim Advocacy runs Stand Up CCSU, a student-led violence prevention campaign that focuses on the prevention of sexual assault, intimate partner violence and stalking through bystander intervention. This past spring due to COVID 19 restrictions and the vacancy of the Sexual Assault and Violence Prevention Specialist, the Stand Up CCSU campaign did not take place. We anticipate having the campaign in the Spring of 2022.

Diversity Training Sessions

During this reporting period, CCSU worked to respond to the directives issued under the previous presidential executive order regarding diversity training. We worked directly with the Commission on Human Rights and Opportunities (CHRO) staff to understand our obligations as the country moved through conflicting executive orders. Then with the onset of the pandemic during these last two reporting periods, the University has worked to move more of its training programs to a virtual format so that faculty, staff, and students will not forego this important training.

During the reporting period a total of 576 new faculty members including lecturers were introduced to Diversity training. Due to COVID 19, this training was done virtually and held over several weeks during the start of the Fall 2020 semester. Every diversity training includes the following: protected definitions; policies and laws; ADA accommodations; hate crimes; internal complaint procedures; and external complaint agencies.

New Faculty Orientation

At new faculty orientation, new faculty members were provided with information on sexual harassment, nondiscrimination, ADA, and sexual misconduct policies, and complaint procedures.

During the reporting period a designee from the Office for Equity & Inclusion provided information on sexual harassment, nondiscrimination, ADA, and sexual misconduct policies, and complaint procedures. During the Fall 2020, the Senior Equity & Inclusion Officer/Title IX Coordinator and the Sexual Assault and Violence Prevention Specialist met with new faculty members and provided information on the Office for Equity & Inclusion.

Title IX and Sexual Harassment Prevention Training

Title IX training has now been required for all full- and part-time employees including student employees and interns. This training has replaced the sexual harassment prevention training as a primary component of this training is sexual harassment prevention, including but not limited to, definitions, policies, laws, and scenarios.

This training was conducted by the OEI staff during the reporting period. The OEI staff will continue to conduct this training for staff and faculty members in the next reporting period. The in-person sessions were moved to a virtual platform in the fall of 2020 due to COVID 19. In person training is anticipated to resume beginning in the Fall of 2021. These trainings are **3-hours** in duration and focus on sexual harassment, gender discrimination, sexual assault, interpersonal violence, and stalking. This training is also offered through an online program, **Not Anymore**. The BOR/CSCU requires that all employees receive Title IX (including sexual harassment prevention) training on an annual basis. In the Title IX training (full and refresher) attendees are informed of the policies, definitions including hostile environment and quid pro quo and scenarios. This on-going/annual mandate continues to enhance our campus' effectiveness in ensuring we are a campus free from workplace and educational discrimination.

Sexual harassment prevention training for Supervisors is made available through virtual sessions and will resume in person once COVID 19 restrictions are lifted for all supervisory employees who have not completed the three-hour in-person Title IX session. Such training conforms with the requirements of Connecticut General Statutes, Section 46a-54(15) (B).

Title IX/Sexual Harassment Sessions

During this reporting period, the Senior Equity & Inclusion Officer or designee continued meeting the requirements of Connecticut General Statutes § 46a-54(15) (B) by providing Title IX (sexual harassment prevention) training for newly hired supervisory employees as well as Title IX Refresher Training for all employees. Such training is delivered by a variety of presenters and venues, such as the CCSU Office of Victim Advocacy, OEI staff and faculty with expertise in conformance with the requirements of

Connecticut General Statutes, Section 46a-54(15) (B). CCSU developed and implemented a Title IX training which includes sexual harassment, sexual violence, and stalking and intimate partner violence to the campus. A copy of the training session outline (via PowerPoint presentation) used during the sexual harassment (Title IX) training sessions is included within the "Supportive Material" subsection which follows this portion of the "Internal Communications" section.

The Residence Life Department requires that all Residence Assistants (RAs) attend a two-hour diversity training program every semester. Additionally, the RAs received Title IX (sexual assault and sexual harassment prevention) training by Joanna Flannigan, CCSU's Victim Advocate.

The designee from the Office for Equity & Inclusion will continue to schedule in-person Title IX, sexual harassment, and diversity training for all new employees as needed and will continue to report the scheduled sessions in CCSU's annual filings.

On-line Training

The University utilizes several different on-line training modules. All faculty and staff have access to an on-line Title IX training, which can be taken annually. Throughout the 2020/2021 academic year, 1,203 employees took Title IX training on-line that include First Net and CHRO's Sexual Harassment Training. Each spring students classified as seniors or graduate students are also required to complete a training focused on sexual misconduct. Both courses are interactive and contain many challenging and interesting real-life workplace situations. Incoming students are required to complete a different online program (Sexual Violence Prevention Program) on Title IX (including sexual harassment and sexual violence issues). 3,329 students took the on-line training.

As employees at CCSU, we are required to complete Title IX training during each academic year. This training is an important part of our efforts to ensure our campus is a safe environment free of sex discrimination. In addition, the state requires that all employees are trained in Sexual Harassment Prevention. Our records indicate that you are required to complete the Title IX Refresher and Sexual Harassment Prevention training this year. To fulfill both requirements, you are asked to complete a self-paced online program using the access information below. Training must be completed by June 30, 2021.

Online Program: The training is available through an online program called Not Anymore. The online program takes an average of 45-60 minutes to complete. You can save your progress and return to the program later. You do not need to complete it in one sitting. To access the online training, please follow this link and sign-in using your CCSU Blue Net ID and password to access the training: https://studentsuccess.org/LDAP/ccsu.

This program will help you:

- Define sexual harassment and Title IX.
- Understand federal laws, state laws, and CCSU policies that prohibit sexual harassment/abuse.
- Recognize specific behaviors that constitute sexual harassment, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking.
- Understand and fulfill your responsibility as a responsible employee/mandated reporter.
- Use remedies and procedures available through the University.
- Build skills to respond to students and colleagues who disclose sexual harassment/abuse.

Dear Central Family,

I am pleased to announce that we have launched a search for our first full-time University Ombudsperson. The search committee has its charge, and I wish to thank Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs Joseph Paige for serving as our interim Ombudsperson.

Support for the hiring of a full-time ombudsperson, rather than a part-time position, was evident in findings from last year's Campus Climate Survey and was also strongly recommended by the CCSU-AAUP leadership a year or so ago. Sibson Consulting, hired in 2019 as part of the Action Plan to Change Campus Culture, advocated moving to a full-time position, as well as reimagining the Ombudsperson model and transitioning to an in-house conflict resolution function.

The next University Ombudsperson also will help to carry out one of the main goals set forth in the 2030 strategic plan, which is to foster an inclusive and safe campus culture that values and encourages individuals to participate in a respectful exchange of ideas. The Ombudsperson will view this goal with a wider scope and to create and implement a University-wide program that ensures fair, timely, and responsible practices in the administration of University policies and procedures. As part of that program, the Ombudsperson will establish an independent and confidential process for faculty, staff, and students to voice their concerns; create mechanisms that will help to prevent, identify, and resolve conflict on campus; and serve as a liaison between individuals or groups — including collective bargaining units — and the University administration.

Among other duties, the University Ombudsperson also will communicate any revised or new conflict-resolution policies campus-wide and provide related training in constructive communication and conflict resolution to the University community.

I would like to thank the search committee members (listed below) for volunteering their time to fill this important position, and I look forward to meeting the candidates they put forward. We will, of course, share more details about the search as it gets underway.

I believe that they have met these goals, and I would like to take this opportunity to once again express my sincere appreciation to the members of the work groups and Steering Committee – thank you!

Through their unwavering commitment and dedication they established a "Blueprint" that will guide us during the coming months. We have much work to do and not much time to accomplish it, especially because our first students arrive on campus tomorrow! The state is requiring international students and out of state students from the coronavirus "hot" zones quarantine for 14 days before moving into their assigned residence hall. The Residence Life, Student Affairs, and Facilities teams have pulled together during the past two weeks to ready Beecher Hall (our quarantine facility) for our students. I am grateful for their incredible efforts!

I look forward to continuing our work together to address issues that arise – and they are certain to. I believe we will achieve the very best in the name of our students if we continue to be innovative, flexible, and respectful.

Dear Central Family,

I am pleased to announce that two members of the Central family have been selected for the annual Distinguished Service Award (DSA). When you consider their exemplary contributions to the University, one can understand why the DSA Committee chose **Dr. Warren R. Perry**, professor emeritus of Anthropology, and **Lisa M. Bucher**, director of the Budget Office and a CCSU alumna.

Dr. Perry retired this past summer after more than 25 years at CCSU. He joined the Department of Anthropology in 1993 and, during his tenure, served as co-director of the Center for Africana Studies and director of the Archaeological Laboratory for African & African Diaspora Studies.

Some of you may have been present at the 2020 Center for Africana Studies Annual Conference when prominent scholars testified to Dr. Perry's trailblazing research. They credited his work for forever changing how Archeology is taught and performed in the field.



His scholarship has significantly expanded our understanding of slavery in the Northeastern United States — particularly in the New York City area through his extensive work at the African Burial Ground site in Lower Manhattan. The site was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1993 and a National Monument in 2007.

Dr. Perry has received numerous awards and accolades, including the "Heart of Gold" Award by the Ebenezer D. Bassett Memorialization Committee for his leadership in the campaign to name an academic building in honor of the University's first African-American graduate.

Ms. Bucher is consistently applauded by administrators, staff, and faculty for her dedication, expertise, accuracy, and commitment to meeting deadlines. They also acknowledge that her collaborative and positive attitude, her courteousness nature, and her generosity with time and knowledge are greatly appreciated. Her work on the CCSU eSports initiative and the 2030 Strategic Plan were cited by her colleagues as integral to the success of both projects.

In 2008 and again in 2015, Ms. Bucher was the recipient of the Merit Award presented by the CCSU chapter of the State University Organization of Administrative Faculty (SUOAF).



In addition to her commitment to CCSU, over the past 15 years Ms. Bucher has volunteered as treasurer of the Cromwell Middle School Parent Teacher Organization and Cromwell Little League.

She earned her Bachelor of Science in Accounting from CCSU and was hired by the University in 2006.





They may also be invited to share their insights on a broad range of issues with the president and senior leadership. Alumni of the PFP may apply in subsequent years for the Senior Presidential Fellow Program.

As part of the application process, candidates must be nominated by an Executive Committee member, the Faculty Senate president, or a dean. The Board of Regents (BOR) announced the system- and campus-wide faculty awards last week, and I wanted to add in my congratulations to our three recipients: Dr. Susan Koski, Dr. Rati Kumar, and Dr. Sylvia Jalil-Gutierrez.

BOR TEACHING AWARD

For those who don't know, Dr. Koski is an associate professor in the Criminology & Criminal Justice Department. In letters of nomination, her colleagues cited her longtime and thorough understanding of the social issues that have shaped the criminal justice system. They credited her with starting deconstructing the role of racial disparities, gender bias, and hate crimes in American society long before those concepts entered mainstream conversation. Her cutting-edge work has been published in several peer-reviewed journals, and her 2020 piece titled "Dog whistle politics: The Trump administration's influence on hate crimes," has been downloaded more than 4,000 times.

Dr. Koski's expertise helped to create CCSU's Racial Justice Certificate program; an elective course on women and criminal behavior; and a brand-new course on racism and bias in the criminal justice system in response to the Black Lives Matter movement, among others.

BOR RESEARCH AWARD

Dr. Kumar, an associate professor of Communication, was lauded as an "exceptional" researcher who takes the culture-centered approach in her research in health care communication. She is actively working to improve health outcomes and communication among marginalized communities around the world and change the discriminatory policies that leave many behind. In fact, this fall, Dr. Kumar was awarded sabbatical leave to pursue a project titled "A Local and Global Culture Centered Approach to Improved Health Outcomes in Marginalized and Displaced Communities in the United States and India."

Her research has appeared in several prestigious peer-reviewed publications, including three pieces published in 2020 alone. She has written book chapters and encyclopedia entries, presented research and workshops at more than 10 national or international conferences and several more on the local level. She is also an experienced grant project leader who has garnered hundreds of thousands of dollars in awards.

BOR ADJUNCT TEACHING AWARD

Dr. Jalil-Gutierrez, an adjunct professor of Anthropology, brings unique perspective to her students as a cultural anthropologist who also holds a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a Master of Business Administration, plus additional professional certifications.

In their nomination letters, her students and colleagues hailed Dr. Jalil-Gutierrez for her high standards; student engagement and accessibility; and innovative teaching methods, including her students' successful participation in the Center for a Public Anthropology's Community Action Project. This global project invites students to consider an important social issue and share their perspectives with their counterparts in other countries. Four of Dr. Jalil-Gutierrez's students earned awards for their contributions to the project.

Every year, the BOR awards offer us inspiring examples of our faculty members who make a significant impact on their students, peers, and communities. Please join me in expressing our pride and admiration for our three honorees!




You count! Participate in the 2020 Census



Book coedited by Dr. Tully wins national prize

The American Historical Association has named "Understanding and Teaching the Civil Rights Movement," a recent volume in the Goldberg Series co-edited by Dr. John D. Tully, as the winner of the 2020 James Harvey Robinson Prize. This national prize is the AHA's highest award for teaching materials and is awarded biennially for the teaching aid that has made the most outstanding contribution to the teaching and learning of history in any field for publicor educational purposes.

This is Dr. Tully's second Robinson Prize award. "Understanding and Teaching American Slavery," which he also coedited, won the award in 2018.







Cardona is expected to be sworn in by Vice President Kamala Harris in the Eisenhower Executive Office Building at 6 p.m. this evening.

In a message to the campus community, President Toro cited Cardona's appointment as an important benchmark for the university.

"Politics aside, I think we can all agree that Dr. Cardona's successful nomination marks a wonderful moment in CCSU history,"she said. "Dr. Cardona will have his work cut out for him in 2021, but I know the Blue Devil spirit will prevail as he begins his tenure in Washington, D.C."

Good news, accolades, and more

We could all use some good news, so here's a recap of recent University and student accomplishments!

For the third straight year, CCSU earned silver-level recognition by Exercise is Medicine for its efforts to create a culture of wellness on campus. Of the 153 campuses recognized this year, 73 received gold, 59 received silver, and 21 received bronze. All gold, silver, and bronze universities and colleges will be recognized in June at the 2021 virtual Exercise is Medicine World Congress.

Film student Abe Azab won a Campus Movie Festival Jury Award for his short film titled
"Men's Room." Jury Awards are given to the top 20 student films during CMF Moviemsking
Week, an ongoing series of competitions that challenges students to create a short film in
one week. "Men's Room" illustrates an intense moment for a transgender man, AJ
(portrayed by AJ Colella), while attempting to use the public men's room.

CCSU was recently awarded a two-year, \$150,000 grant from the Davis Educational Foundation. The grant will enable the University to expand and improve its assessment of General Education learning outcomes. Among other goals, the project aims to increase faculty participation in assessment activities and to establish a partnership between CCSU and Tunxis Community College in which CCSU faculty will mentor Turxis faculty on assignment alignment workshops and assessment retreats. The authors of the grant are Dr. Jim Mulrooney; Dr. Cassandra Broadus-Garcia; Associate Vice President for Planning and Institutional Effectiveness Yvonne Kirby; Reference, Instruction & Assessment Librarian Martha Kruy, and Assessment Coordinator Martie Kaczmarek.



Big wins for the Blue Devils

Women's soccer heads to NCAA tournament

The CCSU women's soccer team will take on the University of South Florida Bulls in the first round of the 2021 NCAA Women's College Cup on Tuesday, April 27. The Blue Devils won its third straight Northeast Conference Championship on April 16 in a 4-0 shutout against LIU.

Central finished the season a perfect 7-0 and allowed just one goal in the seven games played. The team led the NEC regular season in shots (119), points (41), and goals (15). The Blue Devils also swept the six major conference awards, the first time a school accomplished the feat since 2008. The USF Bulls also did not lose a match, going 9-0-2 and

capturing the American Athletic Conference title for the second consecutive season.

Kick-off is at 3 p.m. in Greensboro, N.C.

The U.S. Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association named the CCSU men's and women's cross country teams to the 2020 NCAA Division I Cross Country All-Academic lists on April 2. Qualifying teams have earned a cumulative grade-point average of 3.0 or greater on a 4.0 scale. Sophomores Elias Field and Eddie Nicholas were named All-Academic Athletes.



Dr. Elizabeth Gillespie McRae's talk will center on the mundane efforts of white women in the 1920s to 1970s that developed white supremacist politics and created a strong underlay to our policies, educational systems, social welfare systems, and more. Dr. McRae will discuss how white women edited textbooks, protested school integration, protested busing, facilitated essay contests to justify a separated state, reported children being of mixed race, and took part in other efforts to keep a segregated state. As the civil rights movement and the black freedom struggle registered some victories, these some women retooled their political rhetoric, shifting their explicitly race-based discourse to a more "color-blind" one and continued to build white supremacy into the nation's public institutions.













Her Preedom Ride mugshot has been called one of the most iconic in American history. At the time she was 23-years old, Joan Trumpauer Mulholland participated in over 50 sit-ins and demonstrations including Freedom Rides, the Jackson Woolworth's Sit-in, the March on Washington, the Meredith March, and the Selma to Montgomery March. Her path has crossed with some of the biggest names in the Civil Rights Movement: Martin Luther King Jr., Medgar Evers, Fannie Lou Hamer, John Lewis, Diane Nash, and Julian Bond to name a few. Joan Trumpauer Mulholland will be joining us to discuss her fight for civil rights throughout her lifetime. 



It is framed in the broader context of literary works that engage with issues that are vital today but are also returnings to past poetics, particularly issues essential to understanding and engaging in the work of Etheridge Knight, Lucille Clifton, and John Edgar Wideman.


Sexual exploitation occurs when a person takes nonconsensual or abusive sexual advantage of another for anyone's advantage or benefit other than the person being exploited, and that behavior does not otherwise constitute one of the preceding sexual misconduct offenses.


























Stalking



The communication of an incident of sexual misconduct that is not accompanied by a request for an investigation or adjudication by the institution.

Report

- The communication of an incident of sexual misconduct accompanied by a request for an investigation or adjudication by the institution.
- All communication regarding incidents of sexual misconduct must be referred to the Title IX Officer.
- Even if the student does not request or want to participate in an investigation, they are still entitled to support services and resources.
- The CCSU Victim Advocate can discuss reporting options with individuals to help them fully understand their options and allow them to make the best choice for themselves.

Connect students in need to valuable resources
 Front-line support
 Students may feel more comfortable accessing resources if referred by someone they already know and trust someone they already know and trust misconduct.
 A student disclosing any form of sexual misconduct is putting the university "on notice" that discrimination has occurred. By referring to the Title IX Officer, you are helping us respond to sex discrimination and prevent future discrimination.

BOR Policy on Mandatory Reporting of Suspected Abuse or Neglect of a Child

Any university employee deemed a "mandatory reporter"* who has a reasonable cause to suspect or believe that a person under the age of 18 years has been abused or neglected, has been placed in imminent harm or has had a non-accidental injury is required to report the incident to the Department of Children and Families within 12 hours of becoming aware or suspecting abuse, neglect or imminent harm to a child.

Rights of Reporting & Responding Parties

- ▶ To be treated fairly and with respect.
- The right to have a support person during any meeting or proceeding related to the allegation of sexual misconduct.
 - As long as this person's involvement doesn't delay any meeting related to this conduct and does not directly address the Hearing Body, question witnesses or otherwise actively participate in the hearing process or other meeting pertaining to a report of sexual misconduct.
- ▶ To receive notice at the same time of the outcome.
- The right to request a review of any decision regarding the sexual misconduct matter in which they are involved.
