'Rachel' Illustrates A Nation In Mourning

"Rachel," by Chase Westfall, explores the topic of "mourning" through paintings, sculptures and more. The exhibit name comes from the "archetype of the mourning mother," known as the biblical Rachel. Located in the Chen Art Gallery (second floor) of Maloney Hall, the artwork showcases loss and trauma through "fictional and fictional narratives." Regular gallery hours are from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. The gallery was curated by Central Connecticut Assistant Art Professor Layet Johnson.
