Meet Sarah Mitchell

What do you enjoy most about visiting the Writing Center?

I love that the staff is always friendly and each of them have unique ways of holding sessions. I also enjoy how willing they are to learn about and understand the material I learn in class to better help me improve my work.

Tell us something you've learned in the Writing Center.

One thing I learned is that it is very common for students to know what they are trying to say, but it does not come out right or hard to understand in the paper.

Do you have any advice for people visiting the Writing Center for the first time?

One piece of advice is to schedule longer appointments, from 30 to 60 minutes. This is because 15 minutes is not enough time to get work done, especially if it's your first visit and the staff has to explain how sessions work. I personally shoot for an hour every time. It is better to book for a longer appointment, finish a little early, and get through everything you wanted or needed to work on rather than to book for a shorter session and run out of time before covering everything. Another piece of advice I would give is to try and book with the same person if possible. They may not be available every time you need them, but having the same staff member builds a rapport with them. They are able to learn your typical writing style and understand your weak points. If the person you normally go to is not available, all staff are wonderful and are happy to help.

PREPARE FOR YOUR WC APPOINTMENT

Ever thought about visiting the Writing Center, but you aren't sure how to get started? Follow these tips, and you'll know the ins and outs of how to get tutored!

Most sessions take place for 30 minutes, but you may make an appointment for 15, 30, 45, or 60 minutes. If you are not sure about session length, give us a call or stop by!

In each session, we offer conversation, questions, feedback, and strategies to help you improve your writing. We recommend that you visit us more than once as you work through drafts of your writing.

- Fill out the appointment form on WCONLINE accurately, including your Blue Chip Card number. If you are visiting our physical location, bring your Blue Chip card to your appointment for verification.
- Come in with 1-2 specific goals in mind. If you're not sure what you want to work on, we can help you figure that out.
- If there is an assignment sheet and/or rubric, please bring it to your session.
- Be ready to work actively during the session.
- While we are happy to help with grammar and sentence structure, we do not edit or proofread papers. However, we can help you learn more about how to spot and correct errors.
- If the writing is not for a course, you are still welcome to meet with us!



You may book one appointment per day.

Walk-ins are welcome if there is availability on the schedule.

We will work with one piece of writing per appointment.


