Under the quiet cold of break, there's not a little activity (like a mountain stream under the ice), but the happy bustle of returning students and faculty makes the campus heat up and come fully to life once again.

Odes I. ix is also apropos because it's another one of Horace's *carpe diem* poems, which entreat us to take full advantage of the opportunities each day presents us – and that's advice that, even more than 2000 years later, never gets old.


CLASS LIVING & LEARNING COMMUNITY

FACULTY: DRAKE ANDERSEN

Assistant Professor of Music Dr. Drake Andersen is a composer, technologist, and scholar whose creative work and research focus on improvisation and the use of technology in the arts. Since joining Central in 2024, Dr. Andersen has taught courses in electronic music composition, audio production, and other topics in music technology, while also directing the Central iPad Ensemble. Recent highlights include performing with the Central iPad Ensemble at the Danbury Palace in celebration of Connecticut composer Charles Ives's 151st birthday and a collaborative project in which his students composed original music to accompany video work produced in Prof. Ted Efremoff's video art class. Recent and upcoming professional activities include a research presentation at the Pierre Boulez Centennial in Cleveland in November, a multimedia collaboration with percussionist Lisa Pegher at the Winnipeg New Music Festival in January, and the performance of improvised live electronic score for the film Metropolis with pianist Jenny Lin in February. Next fall, Dr. Andersen will host scholars and musicians from around the world on Central's campus for a centennial celebration of the American avant-garde composer Earle Brown. Stay tuned for more!

Graduating senior Nick Orange is an Economics student at Central. Originally studying Mathematics, Nick decided to pursue an Economics degree after he enjoyed taking the principles courses (ECON 200 & 201). He is proud of the work that he's done in his courses, especially his research paper on Philadelphia's recovery from The Great Recession in 2008 and the subsequent housing issues in the area. Nick is also proud that he's been named to the Dean's List every semester thus far. Fascinated by numbers and business, Nick has been enjoying creating meaningful relationships with his professors and peers. Nick is a member of the Math and Economics Clubs on campus and is excited to see what the future has in store for him. Intrigued by his studies, Nick is considering pursuing graduate school, possibly researching historical economics.



ALUMNA: OLIVIA TUOHY

Olivia Tuohy is a recent alumna who graduated summa cum laude in May 2024 with a Bachelor of Arts in Criminology and Psychological Science. During her time at Central, she was accepted into the Accelerated Master's Program in Criminal Justice, completing the program in May 2025 while also earning her Advanced Detective Certificate. Olivia held several leadership roles, including President of the Criminal Justice Club, founding President of the Zeta Kappa Criminal Justice Honor Society, and a key contributor to the establishment of the Criminal Justice Graduate Society.

Beyond her academic and leadership accomplishments, Olivia applies the skills she developed at Central in her full-time role at a law firm. She was also deeply involved in Success Central, the university's peer mentoring program, where she progressed from mentee to mentor, Senior Mentor, and ultimately Graduate Assistant. In this role, she contributed to research focused on student retention. Olivia remains an active member of the Blue Devil community through her work as a University Assistant in the CLASS Dean's Office. Most recently, she was recognized by the Association of Certified Fraud Examiners (ACFE) for her participation in the Justice for Fraud Victims Project, sponsored through Central.

DEPARTMENT: HISTORY

The History department is a collection of 14 scholar-teachers. We are experts in all regions of the world, from Africa, Middle East, Latin America, and Asia to Europe and the United States. We are particularly happy to have a growing group of faculty who have joined the department over the last ten years. They include Juan Coronado (US LatinX history), Aimee Loiselle (US Women, Labor, and Capitalism), Tyler Kynn (Middle East), Camesha Scruggs (US African American history), Abigail Sargent-Loy (medieval Europe), and Karolina Kolpak (modern Poland and Eastern Europe). These scholar-teachers are bringing vibrancy, new initiatives, and new ideas to the department. Here are a few examples:

SOCIAL STUDIES EDUCATION - Led by Dr. Aimee Loiselle and in cooperation with the School of Education, the social studies education program is thriving. Dr. Loiselle has engaged in several activities that have benefitted our students. She has created an annual internship with the Hartford public school system that enables our students to work with Hartford middle school and high school teachers to develop, design, and pilot new curriculum, and she has helped our students to create a social studies education club, where students gather to share tips and advice about how to navigate the education program and to become a top-notch social studies teacher.

ORAL HISTORY – In an innovative Fall 2025 class, Dr. Coronado introduced students to the field of oral history. Students learned about the usefulness of oral histories as primary sources to fill historical gaps on events and/or people that have been often overlooked by traditional historical approaches.

GAME STUDIES – Dr. Tyler Kynn has singlehandedly created an interdisciplinary games studies minor and, within a year, close to 20 students have signed up for the minor. Thanks to Dr. Kynn's efforts, game studies is a definite growth area for CCSU!

POLISH STUDIES – The Polish and Polish American Studies at CCSU officially welcomed its new Endowed Chair–historian Dr. Karolina Kolpak–in October 2025, uniting community members and friends of the program around a vision of interdisciplinary collaboration and inclusivity. Just a month later, the Endowed Chair delivered her inaugural lecture as part of the Stanisław and Anita Milewski lecture series in Polish History, drawing in a broad audience which included many students from her two new history courses – A Roaring Interbellum: Poland Between the Two World Wars and A Jewish Metropolis: Warsaw Before the Holocaust. The Polish and Polish American Studies Program is excited for the multiple relevant events it will be organizing in spring 2026.

STUDENT CONFERENCE – Dr. Abigail Sargent-Loy has joined with Dr. Matthew Chudnow of World Languages to organize a conference on medieval studies in spring 2026. Both scholar-teachers are doing important work by training students to present their ideas to the public and to make the medieval past of interest to people in the present.

PUBLIC HISTORY – Dr. Camesha Scruggs has joined Dr. Leah Glaser as the faculty leading the department's longstanding and highly successful public history program. Dr. Scruggs brings to our students much needed expertise in museum studies and African American history and seeks to widen the purview of public history and its audience.
